PERSONAL GLIMPSE

What is one of the most memorable experiences of your life?

DR. HENRY MENTZ

When my best friend John and I were 14, we rode our bikes from the Natchez Trace in Mississippi to Memphis, then across Tennessee to Chattanooga, through Georgia back home to Hammond, Louisiana. We'd gradually earned our parents' trust to a degree they were willing to let us undertake the increasingly ambitious bike tours we devised. We presented our plan and talked them into it. Their one requirement: that we call collect every other day.

The next year we upgraded our bikes and planned a more elaborate trip to the Blue Ridge Parkway—we felt much more professional at that point. In 1972, bike bags were almost nonexistent. So my mother taught me to sew, and I made backpacks for the bikes. After taking the bus from Hammond to Washington DC, we rode the 1400 miles back home. We got to see a beautiful part of the country and a lot of wildlife. That trip cost us \$100. We financed these rides with

money we saved from mowing lawns in the summer. We'd camp in the woods, buy a loaf of bread and a pack of bologna. That took care of two days of eating.

I think one of the greatest lessons these experiences instilled within me was the belief that I can accomplish anything. We could have bailed at any time when it got tough. It whet my appetite for adventure...it truly is the spice of life. In my work as a plastic surgeon, it's reflected in my passion for learning new procedures and finding new ways to do things—the application is the most interesting thing. Every case is different. Every case is an adventure. Facelifts require a lot of creativity and tailoring.

DR. GERMAN NEWALL



DR. KRISTI HUSTAK



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Meet Dr. Olivier Deigni, ACPS Fellow 2017 - 2018

Raised on Africa's Ivory Coast, Dr. Olivier Deigni left a promising career as a rocket scientist to become a plastic surgeon. After graduating from a six-year plastic surgery residency program at Saint Louis University, Dr. Deigni

spent one year at MD Anderson as a clinical specialist and microvascular surgery fellow. After completing this, he chose to further refine his aesthetic plastic surgery skills as the ACPS fellow. Q: You have a fascinating background. Tell us a little about it.

A: I was born and raised on the Ivory Coast, or Côte d'Ivoire. It's a former French colony, so my first language is French. My mother, who is from Wisconsin, came to the Ivory Coast as a Peace Corps volunteer in the 1970s. There she met my dad, who was from the Ivory Coast. They fell in Iove, she decided to stay, and they married. So I grew up bilingual.

After I finished my high school in the French system there, I came to the U.S. to study at Georgia Tech, pursuing aerospace engineering with a concentration on space exploration. I completed my undergraduate and graduate degrees and worked at NASA before deciding to go into medicine.



Q. What led you to make such a significant career shift from engineering to medicine?

A: It wasn't an easy decision. I was doing my PhD at Georgia Tech, but I knew in my heart that I wanted to do something beyond the engineering projects I was working on, though I enjoyed them. I befriended some medical students and really enjoyed the work they were doing. So I chose to study biology. I was looking for an opportunity to reach out to as many people as I could in a day-to-day environment. Being a doctor provides that. I enjoy making a change one patient at a time. I felt that was valuable.

I specifically chose plastic surgery because of the variety of cases that we do and the fact that we operate on every part of the body well as on people of every age. As a surgeon and an engineer, I made some correlations: You go from the consultation where you see the problem and define the issue, and then you come up with a solution which

solves that problem. I enjoy that intellectual exercise and then using my hands as a surgeon to put the solution into practice. That has made it particularly meaningful to me.

Q: Why did you elect to do the ACPS fellowship?

A: I'm excited to learn everything they are doing at ACPS, and I want to be well-rounded. Every procedure here presents a unique learning experience. For example, doing a liposuction case requires a lot of finesse and artistic skill. Approaching it from an aesthetic point of view and reshaping the body takes a lot more than just putting in a cannula and removing some fat. I've learned a lot from the surgeons, and I'm looking forward to refining my skills even further.

Q: You have a unique philanthropic vision. What is that?

A: My dream is to be able to return to the West African Coast, establish hospitals or clinics there and devote about three to four weeks a year of pro bono work to perform surgeries in the region. Many areas, especially when you leave the main cities, are remote, and people have very limited access to health care. For some, the nearest facility is a two-day walk, and they can only dream of finding relief from incapacitating injuries. My desire is to bring health care into these remote regions so people can get the help they need for themselves and loved ones.
